It consists of a total of 14 digits, based on 12 codes included in 6 variables organized into 4 decision clusters, yielding to 2 diagnoses.

It is based on Vincenzo Chiarugi's treatise *Della Pazzia in Genere e in Specie con Una Centuria di Ozzervazioni*, published in 1793-1794, in which melancholia is divided into three forms, from which only two, true melancholia and furious melancholia, are included in revised CODE-DD. True melancholia is characterized by anxious mood (depressed mood) and abulia (motor retardation, motor restlessness, or stupor); and furious melancholia is characterized by anxious mood (depressed mood) and abulia (motor retardation, motor restlessness, or stupor), delirium (delusions) and homicidal tendencies (suicidal tendencies).
