

Munich 1962

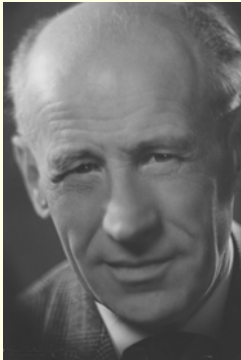
The Munich Congress was an open meeting. The consequence was that – besides basic scientists – especially clinical psychiatrists and psychologists to attended the meeting. President was Paul Hoch – a clinician and at this time commissioner for Mental Health State of New York. Paul Hoch, born in Hungary, partially trained in Germany was a very prominent US psychiatrist and had published (together with L.B. Kalinowsky – a German psychiatrist, who left Germany 1933 and came over Rome, Paris and London to USA) the standard book on somatic treatments in psychiatry in the era before psychotropic drugs.

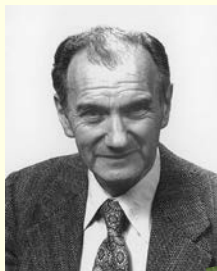

Bente had organized (together with the so-called “Fünfergruppe” already 1959 a “Deutsche Arbeitsgemeinschaft für Neuropsychopharmakologie” (AGNP) arranged (since 1960 up to now) scientific meetings in Nürnberg. AGNP was the first national society for neuropsychopharmacology and had the authority by CINP executive committee to function as “Lokales beratendes Comité des CINP”.

Voitechovsky to realize the CINGP Congress – in spite of all the serious problems happened in Czechoslovakia since 1969.

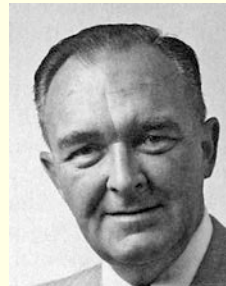

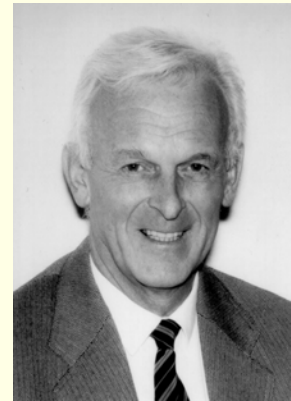
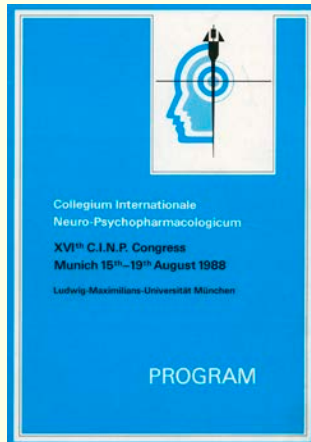
Munich 1988

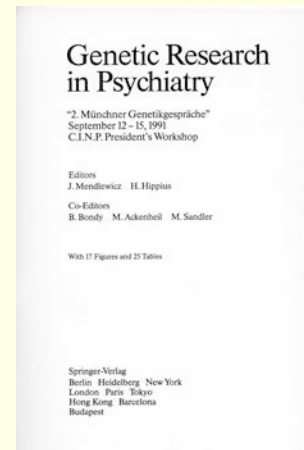
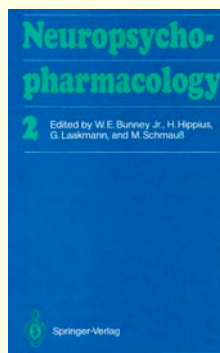
